event is always a great time and well attended. Flyers were handed out at the meeting for invitations to host the 2024 Annual meeting. March 31st is the deadline for your association to submit applications.

The 2024 Tournament sites were awarded by a vote of the delegates at the recent Annual meeting. The **Open** will be hosted by the Orange Belt association in Lakeland, **Women's Championship** will be hosted by the Gulf Coast association, St. Petersburg, Seminole area, **Youth Scholarship** will be co-hosted by Tampa and East Pasco. **PEPSI** will be in Lake County hosted by Lake County and Orlando USBC. **The Mixed Memorial** will be hosted by the Broward County USBC. The **Men's Only** will be hosted by Southwest Florida. **The Women's Senior** will be hosted by Southwest Florida.

Entries for the upcoming **2023** tournaments are on our Florida State USBC website and should be at your local bowling centers. The **Open** will be held in Tampa and East Pasco, the **PEPSI** will be in Tallahassee, the **Mixed** in Lakeland, the **Youth Championship** in Orlando, the **Women's Championship** in Ft. Myers and Cape Coral, the **Senior Women's** will be in Zephyrhills and the **Men's Only** will be in Ormond Beach.

As your tournaments chairperson I thank everyone for entering our tournaments and hope you will continue to support them. Bowlers bringing entries are what makes our events successful and a larger prize fund. \$5000 in donations from USBC Bowl TV has been added to the OPEN, \$3,000 to the Women's Championship and \$2000 to the Youth Championship.

The 2025 tournament bid information will be sent out to all Association Managers and Presidents in February. Now is the time to be thinking about bidding on any of our 7 tournaments. Local associations will receive 75% percent of the profits on all of our adult tournaments and are required to do staffing for the tournament. Detailed information about each tournament will be sent with the deadline information.

I want to take this time to say Merry Christmas, Happy Hanukkah, Happy Kwanzaa, Boxing Day, to all of our Florida members, bowling partners and sponsors. I covered everyone. All of you make our association the greatest in the country and I always say Florida bowlers are the best.

In 2013, USBC made the decision to revise their awards system. The only award they would now provide would be one lifetime achievement of a 300 game and/or one lifetime 800 series.

During the 2014 National USBC Convention, companies were invited to set up booths to promote their products to the associations to begin local association award programs. Greater Miami USBC had already decided to continue to provide achievement awards to their bowlers. The GMUSBC Awards Chairperson was fortunate enough to attend that convention. We checked out a booth that was primarily for the Youth Bowlers. They had "key tag" awards in various shapes and sizes and were well within the budget of our small association. We have only one certified center. Any awards that might be given would come only from our Association.

Thus began a relationship that we are proud to be a part of. That booth was set up by Boost Promotions. They work with us on providing awards on the game level. We used USBC guidelines at first and later adjusted them as needed to accommodate our bowlers. We have seven categories for game scores.

The first few years we awarded a key tag, modifying the imprint design each year for variety. Then we found the bowling pin template Boost had, and we did those one season. Next, we worked with them and came up with a bowling ball design. The photo is of our newest venture together, the bowling shirt.



The awards committee deals with many companies that provide us with various types of awards for various achievements. We have been so satisfied with products from Boost, and the way the whole company works with us, that we decided to share them with other Associations.

This year Keith has donated \$2,544 which pays for the youth bowlers bowling fees for the month of November and December. Way to go Keith!!

Moving on, the Florida State USBC held their annual general membership meeting on October 8-9, 2022, at the St. Petersburg/Clearwater Marriott in St. Petersburg. There were 106 delegates, twelve alternates, six guests and twenty-two state board members in attendance. There was a delegate mixer on Friday night, followed by the 9 pin no tap bowling tournament put on by the host association, Gulf Coast USBC, on Saturday morning. The youth awards luncheon was held at 11:45 a.m. and all the youth winners from the state scholarship tournament and the Pepsi tournament was presented with their awards as well as the Youth Hall of Fame inductions. What awesome youth bowlers we have in the State of Florida. Hopefully their passion for the sport will continue into adulthood. Next was the memorial services for bowlers that we lost from August 1, 2021, to July 31, 2022, as well as former state board members (both BA and WBA) that went to the big lanes in the sky. Each local association placed a carnation in a vase in remembrance of the bowlers in their association. From the memorial service we moved into business that brought all the delegates to the meeting. Reports from the officers and committee chairs were provided prior to the meeting to all delegates so they could be ready with any questions, comments or suggestions. The meeting itself was uneventful.

Election of the officer and director positions whose terms were up were held and the following were elected:

Newsletter Article winners were presented with certificates and/or plaques. Margo Buzzard, Chair, reminded all the delegates that anyone can submit an article about happenings in their area. The more articles the better informed bowlers around the state will be.

David Fields, our USBC Representative, gave his presentation which included highlights of the USBC National Convention, upcoming events and answered questions about the disqualification of some bowling balls.

Tournament bids for 2024 were announced with the following being awarded:

Open Tournament - Orange Belt USBC Senior Women - SW Florida Men's Only - SW Florida Women's Tournament - Gulf Coast USBC Mixed Memorial - Broward County Youth Scholarship - Greater Tampa USBC and East Pasco USBC PEPSI - Orlando and Lake County USBC

The Annual Meeting ended on Sunday morning and the Youth Leaders held their meeting to get ready for the 2023 season.

The unpredictability of the past few years has caused many bowlers to lean away from joining leagues or even serving on local boards. This has put a dent in future-orientated planning and making decisions on the present.

For \$3.00 if you strike in the 3rd, 6th, and 9th frames you can win a turkey for Thanksgiving or a ham for Christmas. You can only win once for that evening of league play. Also, coming up we have our Holiday 9 Pin No Tap Tournament and in February we have our Sweetheart Scotch Doubles Tournament.

Communication is the key to participation. So, we are **"Talking it Up"** fostering our participation among our bowlers.

Greetings from Southwest Florida! All of us hope that everyone has enjoyed their Thanksgiving holiday and are preparing to celebrate the rest of the holiday season with family and friends!

Well, where do I start? Since our last newsletter... many things have taken place in our local area.

First and foremost, our Southwest Florida area was directly impacted by Hurricane Ian on Sept. 28th. Wow! Our area has witnessed some major hurricanes in the past several years, but NOTHING like this hurricane. Ian presented itself to our area for more than 12 hours. The Category 4 (1 m.p.h. less than a Category 5) hurricane just sat over top of our area and would not move on. It honestly felt more like 36 hours instead of 12. For those of us that did not evacuate, we could only sit and pray that we would make it through the storm alive and our homes would still be left standing. Unfortunately, there were many people that were not lucky at all. Fort Myers Beach, Sanibel Island and Captiva islands were just devastated! Many businesses and homes in these specific areas were just demolished, leveled or swept out to the ocean like they never existed. The main reason for the most damage.... Storm surge. There were people that had water in their houses onwards up to 10-12 feet. I personally know a friend that lived in a manufactured home that was totally covered by the storm surge, in which she lost everything. (Thank goodness she did evacuate!) Two words come to mind when reminiscing back a couple of months ago..... Horrible Devastation! I know that I am not alone when I say... "Dear Lord, we never want to witness something like this ever again!" This has had such an emotional toll on so many lives. It still just seems so surreal. It is going to take some areas upwards to 2-4 years to rebuild, if not longer. We did have two bowling centers in our Association in the Port Charlotte area that had so much damage to their buildings that they still are not open as of December 1st. The majority of the bowling centers in our Association re-opened anywhere from 2-3 weeks after the hurricane. It seems that the majority of the leagues voted to extend their winter leagues an extra few weeks so that their prize funds remained the same of what had been previously voted on. This entire scenario honestly seemed like the feeling we all had waiting anxiously to re-open after Covid a few years ago. We missed the camaraderie of our fellow bowling community whether they were our teammates or our fellow competitors. Upon my return to my leagues, I couldn't help but wonder.... How many people we would not see return for whatever the reason may be. Some were moving away, some lost their homes and had to focus on getting things back in order, some did not make it through the storm alive and some were out of jobs so they couldn't afford to come back to our leagues. I do believe that our bowling community did not suffer as bad as it could have. As I bowl each week or stop in and see leagues that I do not currently participate in, it seems that the majority of everyone has returned and have started back bowling again. I have one word for that.... AWESOME!

Secondly, our Association was impacted by the sudden death of a bowler named Buster Rucker that bowled a few nights a week at a couple different bowling centers in our area. He was currently helping coach the North Fort Myers High School bowling team, as he had done for several years previously. He was a personal friend of mine for 41 years. Buster was well known for using the words "Fire Truck!" and "Peanut Butter!" when upset with his bowling. You just never heard him use a curse word. He actually was one of my youth bowling coaches when the Junior Program was known as Y.A.B.A. many blue moons ago (as in back in the early 1980's).

How many of you remember the youth program of bowling named that? If you do remember it, do you remember the mascot named "BIF" that stood for "Bowling is Fun?" (I think he was like a green Martian) LOL! Those were the good 'ole days! Buster will be missed by so many of us in the bowling community, especially here in Southwest Florida. Rest in peace my friend.

Next, at the beginning of November, High School Bowling in the state of Florida was completed. From Southwest Florida, our two Girl's teams went from the schools of Oasis Charter High School (In which I was so fortunate to be their head coach) and Cypress Lake High School. Cypress Lake made the first cut at the State level and finished 16th. Oasis High School missed the cut by 8 pins and finished 17th. On the Girls' individual side, Katarina Hagler from Oasis High School finished 5th overall. On the boy's side, Bishop Verot High School and Cape Coral High School went to the State tournament representing Southwest Florida. Bishop Verot missed out on the first cut, but Cape Coral High School went on to finish 4th in the state. CONGRATULATIONS to all of these outstanding athletes! Everyone is so proud of you! I cannot wait for next year!

Lastly, the Florida State USBC held their annual meeting during the weekend of Oct. 7th – 9th in the St. Pete area. Many things happened that weekend. We are glad to report that our membership is up over 8% this year and one of our leagues that had been around for over 50 years, Hitters & Missers at Pin Chasers Midtown has returned after two years since Covid. They have re-started small but know they will rebuild as strong if not stronger than they were before.

We had four delegates attend the Florida State Annual Meeting in October and attended the dinner and had a fun time.

We started our BVL drive once again since Covid hit and I am pleased to say that we raised \$5000.00 from just four bowling centers, and this was due to our board as well as league officers walking through leagues for donations. It really does make all the difference by walking the envelope/containers around. One of our centers even made flyers and had a special container made with the BVL logo on it. I personally walked through Brandon Signs league and with twenty-four teams collected \$600.00. A suggestion to others might be to challenge members or businesses to donate. Steve's Pro Shop made a \$100.00 donation, and I asked if anyone wanted

to match it and got two additional \$100.00 donors. A check for \$5000.00 was sent to the national BVL and after speaking with Mary, they are going to send us a large check to be presented to the James A Haley Veterans Hospital in Tampa. BVL (Bowler to Veterans Link), has been around for more than 75 years and has been making a difference in the lives of our nation's active-duty military and veterans. The BVL is a non-profit 501c 3 charity. Through the raising of funds, they provide therapeutic as well as recreational programs. I wanted to share this information as it might be helpful to other associations, and we are always looking for ways to increase our donations and look forward to hearing what other associations have success within their areas.

We as a bowling community had our challenges the last weekend (November 12-13, 2022) of the tournament as that mid-week was Hurricane/Tropical Storm Nicole that came ashore in Vero Beach (Nov. 10). The bowling center had limited power before the start of the bowling shift on Saturday (Nov. 12), but with the help of the power company, power was restored in time for bowling to begin. There was a problem with the last squad on Sunday afternoon as the bowling center lost a phase of the power to the building when a storm passed through the area. So, most of the pinsetters and scoring systems were offline. A plan was put in place by Kevin Richardson (Shore Lanes Merritt Island – Center Manager) to try and finish this final squad of the tournament with the only lanes that had power to the pinsetters. First, I want to thank the bowlers who were on this shift for their patience as Kevin, Toni Maddux and Katheryn Auton tried to find a solution to this dilemma.

The word that I would properly describe this last squad event is "UNPRECIDENTED"!

All the remaining open bowlers were removed from the lanes and from the center. The remaining tournament bowlers were spaced on lanes 3-4, 15-16, 25-26 and 35-36 which were the only working lanes in the entire bowling center. Besides that, the automatic scoring system was not working properly, so the tournament bowlers had to manually take score. There was one set of lanes where the pinsetters would not reset after each ball. So, the bowler had to hit the reset button to cycle the pinsetter. A representative from the Space Coast USBC BA (Cynthia Scroll) was down at the ball return rack pushing the reset button after each ball was being thrown.

At the end when the last ball was thrown, silence was in the bowling center signaling the end of the tournament. It was a long day for this last squad and the people that stayed and helped to the end.

Modern Technology VS Old School – Bowling Scores

Technology is always evolving and improving. This is true for bowling. Bowling balls for example are always changing as it seems the bowling ball manufacturers have new models out there every year.

For this topic, we will be talking about the bowling scoring system. In most of today's modern bowling centers they have an automatic scoring system.

Back in the day bowling scores were done by hand where you had to do the math to add up the scores. It may be simple enough, but do you know how to score after a spare or a strike? When was the last time that you took score and did the math adding the frames up?

The traditional bowling center of the early 20th century was advanced in automation when the pinsetter person ("pin boy"), who set back up by hand the bowled down pins, was replaced by a machine that automatically replaced the pins in their proper play positions in the 1950's. The automatic scorer was first field tested at Village Lanes bowling center, Chicago in 1967. The scoring machine received approval for official use by the American Bowling Congress in August of that year. They were first used in national official league gaming on October 10, 1967. In November, Brunswick announced that they were accepting orders for the new digital computer, which cost around \$3,000 per bowling lane. Bowling centers that installed these new automatic scoring devices in the 1970s charged a dime extra per line of scoring for the convenience.

So that is the history of the automatic scorer. Some of us, who are old enough, might remember coming to the bowling center to bowl and getting a paper scoresheet or overhead transparency scoresheet that was projected on the screen above the lanes.

So, with modern technology evolving the question does come up. Do you know how to keep score? Do the current youth bowlers know how to keep score? The youth probably never heard of a transparency scoresheet. Do the seniors in the bowling centers know how to keep score? Do bowlers on your leagues know how to properly keep score?

These are interesting questions to be asked to the bowlers in your association and of your board members. So, the next time you are at your bowling league or local tournament ask the bowlers around you.
