Justin Wedding (grandson of Patsy Wedding) came to bowling just like he does every Tuesday night. Never in his wildest dreams did he think the following would happen. He opened the series with a 279 game. Spare in the first frame, 9 spare in the 2nd frame and then 10 strikes in a row. The second game started with the first 5 strikes, 6th frame a 9 spare, then off the sheet for a 279 game. What would he do in the 3rd game? He had the first 9 strikes, a 9 spare and a strike in the 10th. A triplicate 279 game, bowled 3 different ways, with an 837 series. What a way to bowl your FIRST 800 series. Congrats Justin!

Phil Wessel who bowls at the Oviedo Bowling Center was the 5th place finisher shooting a 924 in the Forty Frame Game National Championship Finals in Las Vegas. Phil qualified for the National finals by placing 1st in the USA tournament this year with a score of 1215. This year there were more than 6,400 bowlers from all 50 states and several foreign countries. Congrats Phil!

Carole Jones is a member of the Orlando Regional USBC Hall of Fame for Superior Performance. Carole moved to Denver and continued to bowl in leagues. In March of this year, she was inducted into the Denver Hall of Fame for Superior Performance. She is now back in Orlando and again a member of our association. Her honor is well deserved. Kenny Lawson was chosen as the newest member to be inducted into the Orlando Regional USBC Hall of Fame for Superior Performance. Kenny bowled in the Seminole County BA and the Orlando Regional USBC for many years. Due to the pandemic his induction has been postponed until we confirm the new date for our Annual Meeting. You're never too old for a homework assignment Michael Nyitray

During our February Ocala state meeting earlier this year a number of topics were discussed. One new topic that was approved by our board is that we are now going to provide on our association website a listing of our State's annual high series and high averages for men, women, boys and girls.

Shortly after returning home I gave Rocky Heckroth, our long-time state association director, a call to give him an overview of this weekend's state board meeting. As we all know, Rocky always try to attend all state board meetings, but was unable to make it to our Ocala '20 meeting. After explaining our ideas of "Top 10" scores, Rocky offered to do some research on behalf of the Emerald Coast USBC association as he was their association manager for more than three decades. We discussed a variety of ways we could recognize all past high scores, we ultimately coming up with reviewing past yearbooks for confirmation for the annual high series and high averages.

Knowing that Rocky is a retired college professor, I then asked Rocky if he would mind if I gave him a "homework project". After a short pause he said, "*Sure, I would love to have something to do, especially if it would help our state bowlers.*" I asked him if he could go through all of his association books and identify the high average and high series for all four categories going back as far as their yearbooks go. That's when Rocky said they have yearbooks going back to the 1964/65 season. He then said he could not be sure how soon he could get this information together, but he did say he knew where their yearbooks were and is looking forward to the project.

Over the following weeks Rocky and I spoke several times regarding his progress. Along the way I learned was that Rocky had a 97th birthday coming up in March. He also told me that he was diagnosed with macular degeneration and all of the reading he was doing was with a magnifying glass. Soon after Rocky's letters started to arrive. What he had done was put together various descriptions of what he had been accumulating. What I found most fun was the opening of one of those letters saying "I'm submitting my homework".

What makes this project even more impressive is that he did have scores from yearbooks going back to 1964. He hand-wrote, in very organized columns, page after page of these his associations annual high series and high averages.

When I called to thank him for one of his 4-page letters the first thing Rocky did was apologize for not having scores from *every* year for *every* category. I assured him no apology was necessary as we appreciate all of the information he's provided. To show how invaluable Rocky was for his association 'homework' he remembered the correct spellings of some of the more unusual last names that I could not make out. These details helped me use the USBC website to confirm dates and specific games of high series. Since then, I've put all of Rocky's information into Excel and will be getting them to our association webmaster soon.

I hope Rocky can be an inspiration for other associations to research their past yearbooks to identify past season high series and high averages they have listed. At 97 years young, Rocky Heckroth shows you're never too old to get a homework assignment. He definitely earned an "A" in my book.

We feel very lucky that the State Board and our local bowling centers have decided to run this event, but just a few months later. I have spoken with our local bowling centers and they have assured me that they will be following all recommended CDC guidelines at that time during this event. So, we are very excited and look forward to cheering on all of the ladies that will be participating in this year's event!

Our local board has actually taken some time off from our volunteer duties since March. (As I am sure most of all of the Association Boards have done). However, prior to the pandemic getting into full swing, our local Board was able to get our end of winter bowling season fundraiser off of the ground. It was a great success! We sold tickets for \$2 each that had 3 numbers on each ticket. Ticket numbers ranged from 000-999. (So, 1,000 tickets were sold in all).
